### ABOUT THE PARKS FOUNDATION

After launching as a grassroots community-led non-profit 501(c)3 organization in 2015, the Foundation grew quickly to become the top provider of community- and school-based outdoor science education in South Napa County. Today, the Foundation serves over 3,000 youth and families yearly in watershed, conservation, and environmental programs. Our staff of five professionals includes highly qualified project managers, educators, and leaders.

These unique programs serve students and community through Napa County and the North Bay. Each year demand grows. Currently the Foundation receives two to four inquiries per month from educators throughout the Bay Area but is unable to meet the need due to lack of facilities. In 2021, the Foundation launched the Napa River Ecology Center project to meet the growing demand for education and conservation programs.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION**



In 2024, 400 4th graders in American Canyon schools became Watershed Explorers through a hands-on, three-part program that transformed the Wetlands Edge trailhead into an outdoor classroom. The program connected students with nature while fostering environmental stewardship.

The experience began with an in-class presentation and nature journaling activity. On the second day, students visited the wetlands, rotating through interactive stations led by partners such as Napa RCD, Napa Open Space, and the Suscol Intertribal Council. Topics included plankton, the First People, macroinvertebrates, wastewater, and wildlife conservation, providing a rich, multi-faceted exploration of the environment. Upon program completion, students demonstrated a 70% increase in their understanding of the watershed's significance.

The program concluded with an engaging session led by the Outdoor Connection team, where students used a hands-on water table to learn about watershed dynamics, examined samples under microscopes, and recorded observations in their journals. In addition, the new Watershed Trainee program introduced 2nd and 3rd graders at Napa Junction to the local watershed through nature walks and scavenger hunts. These younger students identified birds, plants, and even mammals, building foundational knowledge about ecosystems.

Over **400** fourth-grade Watershed Explorers spent more than **2,000** hours exploring ecosystems, water quality, and human impacts, inspiring them to become environmental stewards of the future.





The year 2024 was a milestone for education and environmental engagement. Two enthusiastic 7th-grade science teachers approached Parks Foundation staff with a challenge: organizing a fun, educational field day for their students.

The Parks Foundation staff kicked off the program with an inclass presentation, delving into the wetlands' long and sometimes troubled history, restoration efforts, and the current state of the environment. Students then tackled a hands-on land use activity, challenging them to balance community needs with watershed protection.

The program's highlight was an immersive field trip led by the education team, where students explored the wetlands firsthand. They learned about the area's history, including the role of the wastewater treatment plant and the impact of levee removal and restoration efforts. At Glass Beach, students searched for crabs, skipped rocks, and connected with nature through journaling and observation.

In total, 386 students, 4 teachers, and 12 chaperones participated in over 1,500 hours of hands-on environmental education—a remarkable achievement for all involved!

# THE OUTDOOR CONNECTION





The Outdoor Connection had an action-packed summer! The mobile classroom hit the road, delivering hands-on science and environmental education to Napa Valley Unified School District's summer program. Visits included four district sites and served over 64% of socioeconomically disadvantaged students.

Over 350 students explored the natural world, used microscopes, created nature journals, practiced sound mapping, and more. The excitement was contagious, with kids beaming and wishing the mobile classroom could stay longer!







The Outdoor Connection had an eventful year on the trails, **serving over 720 community members!** In January, the mobile classroom visited the Wetlands Trail to educate visitors about King Tides before they participated in the California King Tides citizen science project. During the school year, the mobile classroom stays active as part of the Watershed Explorers program for local 4th graders.

By June, the Outdoor Connection traveled to Skyline Park for a Discovery Day focused on pollinators, where Teen WILD volunteers shared fascinating insights about butterflies native to Napa County. In the fall, the Parks Foundation collaborated with the American Canyon Arts Foundation to bring engaging pumpkin science activities to the annual Pumpkin Path event.









In 2024, our teen leadership program received exciting updates! To reflect their growing impact and new opportunities, the teens voted to rebrand Teen Play Team as Teen WILD (Wilderness Inspired Leadership & Development).

Last May, we welcomed **24 Teen WILD leaders**—nine returning and 15 new—to the 2024-25 team. These teens work alongside Parks Foundation staff to bring nature programming to the community, contributing to events like Outdoor Connection Trailside Learning Center programs, **trail clean-ups**, community hikes, and more.



Teen WILD members choose from three focus areas—environmental education, conservation, and Earth Day programming—where they plan and lead impactful projects. Volunteers removed over 50 lbs of trash in their first wetlands clean-up! In November 2024, the environmental education committee debuted the first teen-led program, the King Tides Discovery Walk at Wetlands Edge, featuring education stations on King Tides and their impact on local wetlands.

Teen WILD member Alex Lee described the day, "Our stations—one along the trail to Glass Beach and the other at Glass Beach—drew an unexpectedly high number of curious passersby. The poster boards we created were a great aid in supporting the explanations given by our teen leaders. Visitors asked thoughtful questions about the King Tides and were highly engaged. Many complimented the clarity and appearance of our boards and clay models."

The conservation and Earth Day committees will launch their projects in the spring of 2025. Applications for Teen WILD open each March—join us and make a difference!





# NATURE & COMMUNITY



### Wetlands Coffee Mornings

Combining the **beauty of the wetlands**, opportunities for **physical activity** and **socialization**, the Wetlands Coffee Morning series continues to be a favorite way to **connect community with nature**. This year's series was made possible by Starbucks American Canyon and Brian Farmer Insurance. Coffee Morning expanded to include community trail clean-ups and nature walks in 2024.

### Community Hikes

In 2024, the Parks Foundation expanded trail exploration opportunities by welcoming staff naturalist Tammy Saunders and partnering with the American Canyon Soroptimist. Trail events offered both environmental education & social connection for the community. Events included monthly Slow Strolls, a beginning birding walk, a fall Full Moon Walk, and the first wetlands community bike ride with the Napa Bike Coalition and more.



# 200 Attendees

### Earth Day

The American Canyon wetlands provided a beautiful backdrop for the Earth Day celebration, sponsored by Marin Clean Energy, Recology, and Best Earth Goods. Over **200 community members** gathered for demos, environmental education, docent-led walks, and tours of the water reclamation facility. Over **12 eco-conscious partners** joined the Parks Foundation to bring this inspiring event to life.

#### 100 Hours Outside

The 100 Hours Outside Challenge returned for its third year, encouraging residents to spend time outside for better **physical and mental health.** Over 45 days, participants tracked their outdoor activities, aiming for 100 hours. **24 finishers** logged over **3,110 hours outside**, with one participant winning a California State Park pass.





#### 14th Annual Reindeer Run

The Reindeer Run returned to Wetlands Edge Trail in December, drawing a record **670 participants!** Runners and walkers of all ages donned festive attire and enjoyed refreshments, visits with Santa, photos with the Reindeer Run mascot, face painting at the teen-led "sparkle station," and food from Riley's Food Truck. Proceeds support the Parks Foundation's mission to connect community and nature.

### Wine & Wild


In March 2024, the Parks Foundation hosted its first member-exclusive Wine & Wild event at Wetlands Edge Trail. The gathering featured wine, light bites, and a **meet-and-greet with owl ambassadors** from All About Owls. Due to its success, the Foundation plans to launch a public Wine & Wild series in 2025.



### FINANCES AT A GLANCE

2024 was a notable year for finances as we saw a 36% increase in support of the Ecology Center Project and a doubling of our grant revenue. In April 2024, Congressman Mike Thompson presented an \$800,000 check for the Ecology Center while the City of American Canyon committed to \$1,000,000 in support. These funding successes paved the way for a second round of federal funding, expected to be awarded in 2025.

The Foundation relies on community and business partners to keep expenses low. Ecology Center and direct program services account for nearly 70% of expenses, with overhead kept to a minimum. These sustainable financial practices ensure that the Foundation will serve youth and protect the environment for generations to come.







# **EVENING AT THE RUINS**

### A Record Breaking Year

The 8th annual Evening at the Ruins was another remarkable year with enthusiastic bidders, exciting entertainment, and an inspiring cause. Thanks to the generosity of our Sponsors, donors, and bidders we raised \$425,000 to support the development of the Napa River Ecology Center. Highlights of the Evening included check presentations from the City of American Canyon and Congressman Mike Thompson, and Teen WILD leaders sharing personal feelings about the importance of the Ecology Center and Teen WILD program to them.

# **OUR FUTURE HOME**

### The Napa River Ecology Center


The Napa River Ecology Center is a visionary project to repurpose the City's former Corporation Yard into a community education and conservation center focused on the Napa River Wetlands. It is also the future home of the Parks Foundation which will support expanded youth and environmental programs for Napa County and the North Bay region.

2024 was a pivotal year for the project. Planning highlights included securing our Design Permit from the City of American Canyon and approval of our long-term lease by City Council. Seed funding from the City of American Canyon and state and federal agencies allowed us to move forward with project design and permitting. Special thanks to Congressman Mike Thompson for securing \$800,000 in funding through Community Grants. With major funding and approvals in place, the project is nearly shovel ready and construction is expected to begin in early 2026. 
